Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

The first reading and the Gospel of the Mass are 'paired'. They are integral parts of the liturgy, often reflecting a shared thematic or theological connection. The first reading is generally taken from the Old Testament and foreshadows, or prepares us for, the Gospel message. For example, themes of salvation, mercy, and covenant in the first reading can find their fulfilment or echo in Jesus' teachings or actions, as described in the Gospel. This connection helps us to see the continuity and progression of God's revelation throughout Scripture and deepens our understanding of the liturgical celebration.

The main events of Christmastide are now behind us, and until Lent, we follow the Sundays of 'Ordinary Time'. This Second Sunday in Ordinary Time returns to the event of Jesus's baptism, which we celebrated last Sunday. In the Gospel, John the Baptist recognises *Jesus the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world*. John bears witness that Jesus truly is the eternal ('*a man coming after me who ranks before me*') Son of God and is anointed "*the man on whom you see the Spirit come down and rest ...*". Jesus is the Christ.

In the First Reading, the Prophet Isaiah speaks of the Servant, whom Christians have long identified with Jesus, and who has been the focus and culmination of the Advent and Christmas seasons. *He will be a light for the nations, so that salvation can reach the end of the earth. [Is 49:6]*

We, as Christians, might reflect on the witness that we ourselves give through the living out of our baptism, by our co-operating with the Holy Spirit gifted to us and our sharing in the mission of Jesus *to be a light for the nations*.

Parish Review

During 2024/25 the Passionists undertook a Province Review (in Ireland, Scotland, England and Paris). The Review delivered a number of recommendations, one of which is to review our commitment to the parishes for which we care.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

The annual Week of Prayer for Christian Unity begins on **Sunday, 18 January**, and continues until 25 January which is the Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2026 extends an invitation to draw upon this shared Christian heritage and to delve more deeply into our fellowship in Christ, which unites Christians worldwide.

The theme for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity for 2026: *One hope, one calling* - comes from Apostle Paul's letter to the Ephesians: "There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling" (Eph. 4:4). In a world with diverse and often divided traditions and expressions of Christian faith, Ephesians 4:4 reminds us that all believers are part of the "one body" of Christ.

The opening service for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2026 takes place this **Sunday, January 18**, at **8pm** in St Thomas' Indian Orthodox Church, Malankara House, Old Lucan Road, Palmerstown D20 VP97
